Prepare our hearts, O God, to accept your Word. Silence in us any voices but your own, so that we may hear your Word and also do it; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Psalm 13

Over half of the liturgical songs of the Israelites were Psalms of Lament. Written in a time of exile and persecution, these poets trying to give voice to the pain of the people. Today, we lament the violence and injustice of our time and yet, we also remember that even and especially in times of despair, through our baptism we are given the “freedom and power to resist evil in all of its forms” as we put our whole trust in God. How will we put these words into action to show hope for the world?

Our first scripture reading is Psalm 13, a *Psalm of Lament*.

¹ How long, Lord? Will you forget me forever?

How long will you hide your face from me?

² How long must I wrestle with my thoughts
and day after day have sorrow in my heart?

How long will my enemy triumph over me?

³ Look on me and answer, Lord my God.

Give light to my eyes, or I will sleep in death,

⁴ and my enemy will say, “I have overcome him,”
and my foes will rejoice when I fall.

⁵ But I trust in your unfailing love;
my heart rejoices in your salvation.

⁶ I will sing the Lord’s praise,
for he has been good to me.

Our second scripture lesson is from Amos 5:21-24. Amos was a prophet to the nation of Israel around 760 BC. This was about 200 years after the time of King David and King Solomon when the Hebrew nation had split into two kingdoms: Judah to the south and Israel to the north. Although from the Southern Kingdom of Judah, God called Amos to go and preach to the people of the Northern Kingdom, Israel. In these verses, God’s telling Israel, through Amos, that their worship was essentially worthless... that it meant nothing to him. The problem with Israel’s worship wasn’t that there was anything wrong with the rituals of worship they offered God. It’s just that it wasn’t genuine. It was hypocrisy. It went through the motions, but had no effect on their heart.

I hate, I despise your religious festivals;
your assemblies are a stench to me.

²² Even though you bring me burnt offerings and grain offerings,
I will not accept them.

Though you bring choice fellowship offerings,
I will have no regard for them.

²³ Away with the noise of your songs!

Invitation to Holy Communion

I invite you to close your hands- making a tight fist if you can. Let us contemplate what we need to let go of in order to let justice roll down, to let justice prevail in our lives, in our churches, in our world. I invite you to imagine that tight fist as a symbol of the frustration

or anger over violence and injustice. What in particular creates sadness and lament for you? Now slowly open your hands, letting go of the tension there and imagine that cool water is flowing into and over them. It is only in opening to the freedom and power God has given us that our hands become ready for loving action and not closed and ready to meet violence with violence.

We come before you, God of goodness, frustrated and angered by violence and injustice, often feeling helpless and powerless in the struggle. Rather than work at what we can for your reign of love, we just want to throw up our hands in resignation. Forgive us and remind us of the power you give us to name and resist evil in all its forms. Move us closer to compassion and courage to speak up and stand up for what is right and good.

We lift up prayers for people whose names we know, whose circumstances are close at hand. We lift up _____. We lift up other names aloud or in the silence of our hearts of those in the church, of family and friends, of community members.

We lift up prayers for people whose names we do not know, but for whom our hearts break. _____

In this silence, we open ourselves to pray for all creation, for the things left unnamed, the hurts of which we are aware and for the deepest yearnings of our hearts. *Allow for a time of silence.* Move us closer to compassion and courage to speak up and stand up for what is right and good. Amen. As a sign of our commitment to Christ, let us gather around his table.

THE SACRAMENT OF HOLY COMMUNION

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

It is good to cry out for the waters of justice to roll down bringing heaven on earth, watering it with God's will for love-soaked humanity since creation began. For God continues to stand with and for all peoples. And so we sing with all the company of heaven:

**Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might,
heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest!
Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

New birth for creation broke forth upon us in Jesus. Your Spirit anointed him to preach good news to the poor, to proclaim release to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, and to announce that the time had come when you would save your people. He healed the sick, fed the hungry, and ate with sinners.

In these acts of love and justice we see the birth of our call as a church to let the waters of justice roll, knowing we have been delivered from death through a covenant of water and the Spirit. In this moment, we remember all who suffer in our day and imagine how Jesus would respond to them. In this silence I invite you to call to mind and heart, remembering to God the people and places, known and unknown, that need our prayers, that so desperately need a place at our table of love.

Just as he said it that last night with his disciples, Jesus says to us “come, gather around my friends.” This common bread at our table is much more than it seems. This is the brokenness of the world and I feel it as my body. Whenever there is suffering, I suffer with you. I am broken for you.

This common cup at our table is much more than it seems. The blood of innocent ones is too often shed at the hands of oppressors. Whenever there is suffering, I suffer with you. I am poured out for you.

We proclaim this truth: Death is part of life.

Christ has died.

But death will not have the last word.

Christ has risen!

And suffering will end.

Christ will come again...

and again and again, every time suffering is alleviated, comfort is given, food is offered, hope is restored.

Pour out your Holy Spirit on this body gathered here and on our union with each other and with these gifts of bread and cup. May we become your body for the sake of a world where justice rolls down like an ever-flowing stream.
